Subject: RE: question from Dr. Thaney's office re their proposed "Grand Opening" event

Mr recommendation would be for the board to consider a suspension of the Noise Ordinance, assuming the Board chooses this application to be prudent. Absent a suspension of the village code, and in the event that a complaint were to be made, we, as a police department, would have no other choice but to close down the event and/or issue a citation for violating such law.

Should such local law be suspended for this event nothing would preclude the police department from enforcing a Disorderly Conduct violation in accordance with the New York State Penal Law should such action be necessary.

In short, if the Board wants this event to occur, suspend the local law at the next work shop and the police department will deal with the situation if and when it becomes an issue. Just please let us, the police department, know what the final decision is so we know if and how to apply what law should it be necessary.

I did a quick minutes search & in recent years 58 Main has put on a couple of outdoor events with live music & obtained VB ok. (attached)


Not sure if action (ok) was granted since 58 Main appeared before VB requesting such, or if it is actually required.



PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO ZONING CODE SECTION 58-8

Amend 58-8(A)(1) as follows:

-  (1) Site plan and building approval by the Planning Board is required for all land use and/or development within the Village of Brockport, including but not limited to expansion, reorientation, reduction and/or alteration of off-street parking areas and driveways.

PARKING

ARTICLE I

General Regulations

[Adopted 8-20-1951]

§ 34-1. Title; purpose.

- A. This chapter shall be known as the Local law Parking Restrictions / Emergency Parking Restrictions and removal of illegally parked cars and fines and penalties and is herein referred to as the "Parking Code or "this chapter."
- B. Purpose. Regulating the manner or standing of motor vehicles, this chapter establishes the policies, regulations, and standards pursuant to the parking on public lands within the Village of Brockport. These provisions are enacted to:
 - (1) Establish areas designated for motor vehicle parking within the Village of Brockport.
 - (2) Manner of parking motor vehicles
 - (3) Removal of illegally parked motor vehicles
 - (4) Emergency Parking Restrictions

§ 34-2. Definitions. [Amended 2-2-1976 by L.L. No. 2-1976,]

As used in this Local law, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated, as set forth from the Vehicle and Traffic Law of the State of New York; and if no specific definition is set forth therein all words shall have their usual meanings in the English language.

AUTHORIZED EMERGENCY VEHICLE — Every ambulance, police vehicle, fire vehicle or any other authorized emergency vehicles.

CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER - An Officer employed by the Village of Brockport as certified by the State of New York either in the capacity of Code Enforcement Officer, Building Inspector, Fire Marshal, Planning/Zoning Officer, Peace Officer, Stormwater Manager, Floodplain Administrator, or any combination thereof.

CODE ENFORCEMENT INSPECTOR - Shall be deemed to include the Code Enforcement Officer and all Inspectors employed by the Village of Brockport, as certified by the State of New York either in the capacity of Code Enforcement Officer, Building Inspector, or Fire Marshal, and/or titled as the Assistant Code Enforcement Officer, Assistant Building Inspector, Deputy Fire Marshal, or any combination thereof.

EMERGENCY ACCESS ROADS – A road that provides passageway for authorized emergency vehicles to a facility, building or portion thereof.

FIRE LANE – A Road or other passageway developed to allow the passage of authorized emergency vehicles. A fire lane is not necessarily intended for vehicular traffic other than for authorized emergency vehicles.

MOTOR VEHICLE - Includes but not limited to all vehicles propelled by any power other than muscular power, except horsedrawn wagons or carriages, which can include but are not limited to automobiles, trucks and motorcycles.

PARKING – The standing of a vehicle or trailer, whether occupied or not, otherwise than temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading merchandise or passengers.

STANDING – The stopping of a vehicle, whether occupied or not, temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in receiving or discharging passengers or goods.

STOPPING - When prohibited, any halting, even momentarily, of a vehicle, whether occupied or not, except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic or in compliance with the directions of a police or fire-police officer or traffic control sign or signal.

STREET – The entire width between the boundary lines of every way publicly maintained when any part thereof is open to the use of the public for purposes of vehicular travel.

TRAILER – Used in reference to vehicles other than House Trailers, Travel Trailers or Recreational Vehicles and shall include all vehicles coming within the definition of “trailers” in the Vehicle and Traffic Law of the State of New York and shall include trailers designed to carry boats, cargo, freight and other items of personal or discarded property.

- (2) Parking lot between King Street and Erie Street
- (3) North side of Water Street.

Except: parking can be prohibited when either posted or given notice of any Village of Brockport authorized or sanctioned event.

- (4) Parking lots at the following locations between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. on Tuesday and Thursday:
- (5) South side of Erie Street.

(6) South side of Water Street.

(7) South side of Market Street.

Except: parking spaces adjacent 38 Market Street for Brockport Fire Department members.

(8) South side of Clinton Street.

Except: parking spaces in front of 1 Clinton Street for employees and vehicles conducting business with the Brockport Police Department.

(9) Harvester Park Visitors Center, 11 Water Street.

(10) Merchant Street, west side from Clinton Street to 38 Merchants Street.

(11) Village of Brockport Municipal Office, 49 State Street between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. on any day.

Except: vehicles parked for conducting business with the Village of Brockport.

§ 34-4. Establishment of Fire Lanes or emergency access roads

- (a) The Code Enforcement Officer shall have the authority to require the establishment of fire lanes or emergency access roads, and their required postings on public and private property within the Village of Brockport.
- (b) Where required by the Code Enforcement Officer fire lanes or emergency access roads shall be posted with signs or other notices identifying such fire lanes or emergency access roads and the instructions to prohibit the obstruction thereof. Signs or notices shall be maintained in a clear and legible condition at all times and shall be replaced or repaired when necessary.
- (c) Vehicles parked in violation of this section shall be subject to § 34-9 and §34-10 of this chapter.

§ 34-5. Established Fire Lanes or Emergency Access Roads

- (a) Alleyway running perpendicular to the rear of Main Street from Clinton Street to King Street, known as Decker Alley.
- (b) Alleyway running perpendicular to the rear of 16 – 20 Market Street to State Street

- (c) Alleyway running perpendicular to the rear of 21 – 25 Main Street from Water Street North, know, as Warehouse Street.
- (d) 40 Allen Street A.D Oliver Middle School
- (e) 36 Colman Creek Rd. Christ Community Church
- (f) Holley Street, Student lane Apartments access driveways
- (g) 153 Main Street Nativity Church
- (h) 204 Main Street access driveway to the rear of
- (i) 222 Main Street Village Center Apartments access driveway
- (j) 4 Owens Road, Emergency access road North and West sides.
- (k) South Ave, Winton Woods Townhomes access driveway
- (l) 300 State Street access driveways.
- (m) 18 N. Main Street, Villager Apartment access driveways
- (n) 71 West Ave, Presidents Village access driveways
- (o) 55 N. Main Street access driveway to the rear of
- (p) 63 N. Main Street access driveway to the rear of
- (q) 156 West Ave. hospital
- (r) Or any fire lanes or emergency access roads require by the code enforcement officer hereafter.

§ 34-6. Parking in public parks.

- A. No person shall park a motor vehicle or trailer in any public parks owned and so designated by the Village of Brockport, including parking lots appurtenant thereto, between sunset and sunrise.
- B. No person shall park any motor vehicle or trailer unless such person is at that time using the park facilities during permitted times.
- C. Vehicles parked in violation of this section shall be subject to § 34-9, & §34-10 of this chapter.

§ 34-7. Standing and parking of Commercial vehicles

No person shall stop, stand or park any commercial vehicles with or without a trailer designed or rated by its manufacture to carry or haul cargo of a capacity exceeding 1 ton or more upon any public street, public parking lot or residentially used premises except for a period of loading or unloading.

§ 34-8. Manner of parking vehicles. [Amended 11-19-1973, effective 1-1-1974]

- A. No motor vehicle or trailer shall be parked on any street within the corporate limits of the Village of Brockport between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m.
- B. No vehicle or trailer shall stand or park in a roadway other than parallel

with the edge of the roadway and with the curb side of the vehicle within twelve inches of the edge of the roadway, and such vehicles shall be headed in the direction of traffic; nor shall any vehicle be parked so as to interfere with, block or otherwise obstruct the free and unhindered use of any public sidewalks and crosswalk areas or any village easements, Rights of Way, private and/or public driveways, alleys and entrances.

- C. No vehicle or trailer shall be parked between any sidewalk area and the adjacent street.
- D. No vehicle shall be parked or operated on any part of any property that has not been paved or otherwise surfaced with an all-weather, dustproof material. [Added 10-17-1988 by L.L. No. 5, 1988¹⁸] All Off street parking requirements and parking areas are reviewed and approved by the Planning Board upon application set-forth by Chapter 58 Section 58-22 B(2) of the Zoning Code.
- E. No vehicle or trailer shall be parked in any designated Handicapped Accessible parking space unless said vehicle is displaying clearly a valid and legible handicapped parking permit or license plate but in no case shall a vehicle occupy any adjacent access aisle.
- F. No vehicle or trailer parked on any roadway or in any municipal parking lot may occupy more than one lined parking space at any one time, and shall be parked entirely within any such lines as clearly painted on such roadway or parking lot owned and maintained by the Village of Brockport.
- G. No vehicle or trailer shall be parked within, stop, stand or block any fire lane or emergency access roads.
- H. No motor vehicle or trailer shall stop, stand or park in within 3' (three feet) of any municipally or privately owned fire department fire protection control system, inlet, connection, valve or exit access or path of travel to a buildings door/doorways.

§ 34-9. Violations and penalties. [Amended 12-2-1968; 2-2-1970; 1-21-1980 by L.L. No. 1, 1980; 8-1-1988 by L.L. No. 4, 1988¹⁹]

- A. Vehicles or trailer violating the parking lot regulations from November 15 through April 1 each year can be towed at the owner's expense, and shall be subject to parking violation fines as established by the Board of Trustees.
- B. Vehicles or trailer violating the parking lot regulations from April 2 through

- C. November 14 each year shall be subject to parking violation fines as established by the Board of Trustees. [Amended 5-6-1991 by L.L. No. 2, 1991²⁰]
- D. Any person who violates any section of this Local Law, unless otherwise stated, shall pay to the Village of Brockport a penalty in an amount as established by the Board of Trustees for each and every offense. In the event that said penalty is not paid within 30 days, the amount shall increase as established by the Board of Trustees, Sundays and holidays are not exempted from the respective time periods involved. [Amended 5-6-1991 by L.L. No. 2, 1991²¹]

§ 34-10. Removal of illegally parked motor vehicles.

- A. No person shall allow, permit or suffer any vehicle or trailer registered in his name stall stand or park in the Village of Brockport in violation of any of the Local Law regulating the parking and standing of vehicles or trailers, nor shall any vehicle or trailer be so parked or placed by any person.
- B. Any vehicle or trailer found standing or parked in violation of any such Local Law in a public place or street may be removed, towed or conveyed by, or at the direction of, a member of the Brockport Police Department, to a vehicle impoundment facility to be designated by the Board of Trustees of the village, and such removal shall be deemed the abatement of a nuisance and at the risk and expense of the owner or person entitled to possession of such vehicle or trailer. Said removed vehicles or trailer may be stored in designated vehicle impoundment facility at the risk and expense of the owner or person entitled to possession thereof. Such owner or person entitled to possession of the vehicle or trailer so removed or stored may redeem the same by paying to the vehicle impoundment facility, or to such person as may be designated by the Board of Trustees, the amount of all expenses actually and necessarily incurred in effecting such removal, together with the charges for storage.
- C. In the event of the removal of a motor vehicle or trailer and the payment for such removal, storage or sale above provided, any further prosecution for a violation of a parking ordinance arising out of the same violation shall be barred. However, in lieu of such removal, a police officer may serve upon the owner a summons, in which event the penalties otherwise provided shall apply, or he may affix a ticket as provided by law.
- D. In the event the owner or person entitled to possession of a vehicle or trailer so removed shall claim there is a dispute as to ownership or right to possession of such vehicle or trailer, upon written notice to the person in

charge of said vehicle or trailer in storage, the vehicle or trailer shall remain in storage pending determination of ownership.

§ 34-11. Validity.

- A. Severability. If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this code shall be declared invalid for any reason whatsoever, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this code, which shall continue in full force and effect, and to this end the provisions of this code are hereby declared to be severable.
- B. Saving clause. This code shall not affect violations of any other ordinance, code or regulation of the municipality existing prior to the effective date hereof, and any such violation shall be governed and shall continue to be punishable to the full extent of the law under the provisions of those ordinances, codes or regulations in effect at the time the violation was committed.
- C. Unconstitutionality or invalidity in part. Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase in this code be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remainder of the code shall not be affected thereby and shall remain in full force and effect, and to this end the provisions of this code are declared to be severable.

§ 34-12. Effective Date.

This local law shall take effect immediately upon filing in the office of the New York State Secretary of State in accordance with section §27 of the Municipal Home Rule Law.

ARTICLE II
Emergency Parking Restrictions
[Adopted 11-21-49]

§ 34-13. Declaration of the existence of Emergency Parking Restrictions

- A. Whenever road conditions in the Village of Brockport have become hazardous or such that the free movement of Fire or EMS apparatus, Police vehicles, any emergency vehicles or municipal vehicular traffic may have become impeded by reasons of snow, freezing rain, ice, smoke, fire, or any other natural or manmade hazardous cause, the Mayor or Deputy Mayor or their designee is hereby authorized to declare the existence of Parking Restrictions and/or Emergency Parking Restrictions based upon the advice of the Police Chief, Fire Chief, Superintendent of Public Works, or their designees.

§ 34-14. Declaration of Emergency Parking Restrictions. [Added 12-4-1978 by L.L. No. 10-1978]

- A. During an Emergency Parking Restriction crisis, the Mayor or Deputy Mayor of the Village of Brockport or their designee shall have the authority to declare that a parking emergency exists, which bans any parking from all streets, or parts thereof in the Village of Brockport and/or all village parking lots. This emergency shall be declared by whatever reasonable means are available. In addition to the sanctions prescribed in § 34-9, § 34-10 and § 34-13, owners of vehicles shall be responsible for any and all costs of removing their parked vehicles and shall be subject to parking violation fines as established by the Board of Trustees.

§ 34-15. Duration of Emergency Parking Restrictions.

- A. Emergency Parking Restrictions shall exist as long as the emergency or similar crisis exists. The Mayor or Deputy Mayor of the Village of Brockport or their designee shall, from time to time, issue public announcements regarding the duration or termination of Emergency Parking Restrictions by whatever reasonable means are available.

§ 34-16. Declaration by Superintendent of Department of Public Works

- A. Whenever road conditions in the Village of Brockport necessitate closure for the operations of the Department of Public Works, the Superintendent of Public Works, or his designee can authorize the closure which bans any parking from streets, or parts thereof in the Village of Brockport and/or all village parking lots. This parking restriction shall be declared by whatever reasonable means are available. In addition to the sanctions prescribed in § 34-9, § 34-10 and § 34-13, owners of vehicles or trailer shall be responsible for any and all costs of removing their parked vehicles or trailer and shall be subject to parking violation fines as established by the Board of Trustees.
- B. Whenever roads or streets in the Village of Brockport necessitate closure for a publicly authorized event such as but not limited to parades, walks or festivals the Village Board of Trustees can authorize the closure which bans any parking from streets, or parts thereof in the Village of Brockport and/or all village parking lots. This parking restriction shall be declared by whatever reasonable means are available. In addition to the sanctions prescribed in § 34-9, § 34-10 and § 34-13, owners of vehicles or trailers shall be responsible for any and all costs of removing their parked vehicles or trailer and shall be subject to parking violation fines as established by the Board of Trustees.

§ 34-17. Violations and penalties. [Amended 3-16-1998 by L.L. No. 3-1998²²]

- A. Any person who violates any section of these parking regulations, unless otherwise stated, shall pay to the Village of Brockport a penalty in an amount as established by the Board of Trustees for each and every offense.
- B. Any person who violates any of this Local Law unless otherwise stated shall, pay to the Village of Brockport a penalty in an amount as established by the Board of Trustees for each and every offense as prescribed in § 34-9 and § 34-10. In the event that said penalty is not paid within 30 days, the amount shall increase as established by the Board of Trustees, Sundays and holidays are not exempted from the respective time periods involved

§ 34-18. Validity.

- A. Severability. If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this code shall be declared invalid for any reason whatsoever, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this code, which shall continue in full force and effect, and to this end the provisions of this code are hereby declared to be severable.
- B. Saving clause. This code shall not affect violations of any other ordinance, code or regulation of the municipality existing prior to the effective date hereof, and any such violation shall be governed and shall continue to be punishable to the full extent of the law under the provisions of those ordinances, codes or regulations in effect at the time the violation was committed.
- C. Unconstitutionality or invalidity in part. Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase in this code be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remainder of the code shall not be affected thereby and shall remain in full force and effect, and to this end the provisions of this code are declared to be severable.

§ 34-19. Effective Date.

This local law shall take effect immediately upon filing in the office of the New York State Secretary of State in accordance with section 27 of the Municipal Home Rule Law.





FIRST. I direct that all of my just debts and funeral and administration expenses be paid as soon as practicable after my decease.

SECOND. I give, devise and bequeath my interest in my residence and all of the contents thereof which I may own to my brother, DELAND T. SHAFER, and if he predeceases me, then I give the contents to the WESTERN MONROE HISTORICAL SOCIETY, INC.

THIRD. I give and bequeath two sums of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) each to the VILLAGE OF BROCKPORT, New York, one of such sums to be used in improving or furnishing the meeting rooms or quarters of the members of the Volunteer Firemen of the Village; the other such sum to be used in improving or furnishing the meeting rooms or quarters of the members of the Volunteer Fireman Ambulance Corps of the Village of Brockport; such sums to be accepted by the Village Trustees and expended by them for those purposes.

FOURTH. All of the rest, residue and remainder of my property I give, devise and bequeath to the LINCOLN ROCHESTER TRUST COMPANY of Rochester New York, in TRUST, nevertheless, to be known as the Vivian Shafer Trust Fund, to hold, manage, invest and reinvest as follows:

A. I direct my Trustee to pay ten per cent (10%) of the Trust income to my dear friend, LOUISE F. LYON of 125 West High Terrace, Rochester, New York, or to others for her benefit for the remainder of her natural life, and upon her death her share to be paid to the METHODIST HOME FOR CHILDREN in addition to the provisions hereafter made for that beneficiary.

B. I direct my Trustee to pay the balance of the Trust income in perpetuity to the following named charitable institutions, each taking their proportionate share of the net income after payment of Trust administrative or other proper expenses as follows:

- 1. To the Trustees of the BROCKPORT UNITED METHODIST CHURCH of Brockport, New York, Twenty per cent (20%) for proper Church purposes.

2. To the Trustees of the WESTERN MONROE HISTORICAL SOCIETY, INC. of Brockport, New York, fifteen per cent (15) for the care and improvement of the Morgan-Manning House in Brockport, and if said building is ever destroyed or razed, for the purposes of that society.

3. To the Trustees or Board of Directors of the RUSHVILLE CEMETERY ASSOCIATION of Rushville, New York, ten per cent (10%) to be used in the care and improvement of the cemetery property, in memory of my mother and her family, the family of Loyal Case Twitchell.

4. To the Trustees or Board of Directors of the EAST CLARKSON CEMETERY ASSOCIATION (Garland Cemetery) of Clarkson, New York, ten per cent (10%), to be used in the care and improvement of the cemetery property, in memory of my father, Fred Shafer and my father's family, that of Jonas H. Shaffer.

5. To the Trustees or Board of Directors of the LAKEVIEW CEMETERY ASSOCIATION of Brockport, New York, ten per cent (10%), in the care and improvement of the cemetery property, generally in memory of my parents and my brother and I who are or will be interred there.

6. To the Board of Managers of the METHODIST HOME FOR CHILDREN, a corporation not for profit known as "Gateway" of 6350 Main Street, Williamsville, New York, fifteen per cent (15%) to be used for such purposes as the Board shall determine to be in the interest of the children under its care.

7. To the Board of Trustees of the Village of Brockport for the SEYMOUR LIBRARY and the museum in the Seymour Library exclusively and as the Trustee may determine for the current needs of the library and the museum to be accumulated for future major improvements.

8. It is my hope that my investments made be used intact to produce Trust income without the sale of any of such investments and if my estate has insufficient cash to pay the specified legacies, the legal expenses of probate, estate taxes and debts of mine, or my estate,

I authorize my Trustee, but do not direct it, to defer distribution to the charitable beneficiaries, while accumulating and using income for the expenses above listed and to commence payment of income to said charities when such other charges have been satisfied. This decision, I leave to the sole discretion of my Trustee-executor and to its appreciation of the importance of the charitable deduction in the Federal and New York Estate Tax Laws.

9. If, at any time, any charity above named does not qualify as an organization described in Section 170(c) of the federal Internal Revenue Code, then the Trust shall be transferred to or for the use of an organization or organizations selected by the Trustee which are described and qualify under Section 170(c).

(a) In the administration of the Trust, the Trustee is prohibited from exercising any powers or discretion in such manner as to cause the Trust to fail to qualify under the provisions of the federal Internal Revenue Code as a charitable remainder unitrust, including, but not by way of limitation, the following:

(1) Any act of self-dealing (as defined in Section 4941(d) of said Code.

(2) From retaining any excess business holdings (as defined in Section 4943(c) of said Code.

(3) From making any investments in such manner as to incur a tax under Section 4944 of said Code.

(4) From making any taxable expenditures (as defined in Section 4945(d) of said Code.

The Trustee shall distribute the net income from the Trust and, to the extent necessary, such portion of the principal thereof, so as not to subject the Trust to tax under Section 4942 of said Code.

10. I authorize my Executor and also my Trustee (including any substitute or successor personal representative or Trustee) in its discretion, with respect to all property, real and personal, at the time forming part of my estate or any trust, including property held under a power in trust, without limitation by reason of enumeration and in addition to powers conferred by section 11-1.1 of the Estates, Powers and Trusts Law and other law, to:

(a) retain any or all property owned by me at my death; acquire by purchase or otherwise, and retain, temporarily or permanently, any kind of realty and personalty, including stocks and unsecured obligations, undivided interests, interests in investment trusts, mutual funds, discretionary common trust funds, leases, and property which is outside of my domicile, all without diversification as to kind or amount and without being limited to investments authorized by law for trust funds (including the discretion to retain as an investment any obligation or obligations owing to me by any corporation in which I have a stock interest at the time of my death) and hold funds uninvested, or deposit any moneys in one or more savings or other banks (including the fiduciary or any owned by or affiliated with it) in any form of account whether or not interest bearing;

(c) vote in person or by general, limited or discretionary proxy, with respect to any investment that may be owned by my estate or any trust, or consent for any purpose, in respect of any stocks or other securities; exercise or sell any rights of subscription or other rights in respect thereof;

(d) sell, exchange or otherwise dispose of realty and personalty, publicly or privately, wholly or partly on credit or for any consideration including stocks, bonds or other corporate obligations and grant options for the purchase, exchange or other disposition of any such property;

(e) delegate discretionary powers to agents, remunerate them, and pay their expenses; employ and pay the compensation of accountants, custodians, legal and investment counsel;

(f) renew, assign, alter, extend, compromise, release, with or without consideration, or submit to arbitration, obligations or claims, including taxes, held by or asserted against it or which affect estate or trust assets;

(g) hold property in bearer form or in the name of a nominee or nominee;

(h) abandon, in any way, property which it determines not to be worth protecting;

(i) pay all expenses, costs, fees and other charges incurred in connection with the preservation, protection and delivery of all personal property even though such property is specifically bequeathed;

(j) abstain from rendering or filing any inventory or periodic account in any court;

(k) determine whether my estate shall be valued under the optional provisions of the federal estate tax laws and what elections shall be exercised and what proceedings shall be undertaken to complete the ascertainment of the federal estate tax in my estate;

(l) execute and deliver any and all instruments in writing which it may deem advisable to carry out any of the foregoing powers. No party to any such instrument in writing shall be obliged to inquire into its validity;

12. Each charitable Trust beneficiary shall use the income paid to it for its own proper, charitable purposes generally and I relieve each and every Trust beneficiary from any responsibility of accounting to my Trustee for such use of said funds.

FIFTH. My Executor and Trustee shall serve without bond, surety or security.

SIXTH. All estate taxes shall be paid from the rest, residue and remainder of my estate without apportionment.

SEVENTH. I appoint the LINCOLN ROCHESTER TRUST COMPANY as Executor of my will and as Trustee of all Trusts created hereunder, with full power and authority to sell and convey, lease or mortgage real estate; hereby revoking all former wills by me made.




Re: Antique Fire Equipment

Please be advised that the Village Board may be willing to consider relinquishing ownership of the two pieces of antique fire equipment currently in your possession and used for display and parade purposes.

Our Insurance Broker of Record places an estimated value of \$20,000 on the 1840 Pierce Hand Pumper and \$15,000 on the 1876 Silsby Steam Engine. It costs the Village \$255.20 per fiscal year (\$127.60 each) to insure. The Village Attorney previously advised that it cannot be gifted to the Fire District or the Firefighters Association. However, reasonable consideration can be accepted.



AGREEMENT

This agreement, effective as of December 1, 2012, or upon execution by both parties, by and between the VILLAGE BOARD TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF BROCKPORT, Monroe County, New York, (the "Village") with offices at 49 State Street, Brockport, New York 14420, and the BROCKPORT FIRE DISTRICT, a New York fire district, having an office at 38 Market Street, Brockport New York 14420 in the Village of Brockport, Monroe County, New York (District).

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the District and the Village wish to enter into this municipal cooperative agreement in the spirit of cooperation, and in an attempt to cut costs and share equipment and facilities, and

WHEREAS, the District owns and/or operates property located in the Village, including at 38 Market Street, Brockport, New York, and

WHEREAS, the Village, as one of its governmental functions provides snow removal and snow plowing to its municipal facilities, and

WHEREAS, inherent in such responsibility the Village maintains the necessary equipment to carry out such functions and the Village has the equipment to plow, salt, and remove excessive accumulations of snow and/or ice, which equipment is available at, during and after snowfalls, and

WHEREAS, the District in its capacity in providing fire and emergency service to its constituents, which include the village residents, is in need of accessibility to the facilities and buildings that store its fire equipment on a 24 hour, 7 day a week basis, and

WHEREAS, such accessibility is crucial to an adequate response to an emergency anticipated and expected from its constituents, and

WHEREAS, as one of its obligations to the Village, as set forth in the deed from the Village to the District, the District must make some parking spaces in the Market Street parking facility available for public parking, and

WHEREAS, the Village plows village properties located adjacent to and in close proximity to the property of the District;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms and conditions contained herein, and in accordance with the New York State General Municipal Law, Article 5-G, the parties herein do covenant and agree as follows:

SNOWPLOWING

1. The Village will remove snow and/or ice at the District properties in the Village of Brockport located at 38 Market Street, Brockport, New York, 191 West Avenue, Brockport, New York, and the Capen Hose Company No. 4 Property (subject to the Village's receipt of a lease between the Fire District and the Capen Hose Company No. 4) at 237 South Main Street, Brockport New York, when there is an

accumulation of snow on the properties of the District, as necessary to keep the parking lots of the properties open for use by the public and Fire District personnel.

2. The Village will plow and/or de-ice ramps, the parking lot and driveway at said sites during and after snow storms and will push back the heavy accumulation of snow on the site using its own equipment and when necessary remove such snow from the property.
3. The Village will not be responsible for the restoration of pavements, or turf damage because of the Village's work.
4. To the extent as reasonably possible, the Village will render such services at times commensurate with the Village's removal of snow or de-icing on its own facilities.
5. The District will not be required to notify the Village when the District needs the Village's services. The Village will schedule the services, taking into account the District's needs. It is anticipated that when the Village will plow and/or de-ice ramps, the parking lot and driveways of its own facility, that it will do the same on the district properties.
6. The consideration exchanged for this service shall be \$1,000.00 and the Village will provide these services under the authority of §119-o of the General Municipal Law.
7. The District waives all damages against the Village and hereby indemnifies and agrees to hold harmless the Village from all liability and damages, including attorney's fees, that the Village may incur due to the service to be rendered by the Village to the District.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

8. This Agreement shall commence on December 1, 2012, or upon execution by both the District and Village, and shall terminate on the 30th day of November, 2013.
9. Either party may terminate this Agreement, with or without cause, upon written notice to the other party.
10. At least ninety (90) days before the end of the term of the Agreement, this agreement may be renewed for an additional one year term, by giving written notice to the other party of its intention to renew this agreement. The terms and conditions of this Agreement shall remain the same unless otherwise amended in writing.
11. The Village and the District agree to comply with all federal, state and local laws, resolutions, ordinances, codes, rules and regulations applicable to the performance of the terms of this agreement.
12. This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties and may be modified or assigned only in writing signed by duly authorized representatives of both parties. This Agreement is binding on the parties, their successors, legal representatives and assigns. Any provision of this Agreement

prohibited by law will be deemed amended to conform to such law without in any way invalidating or affecting the remaining provisions.

13. If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid by a court of law, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected thereby if such remainder would then continue to conform to the laws of the State of New York.
14. This Agreement will be deemed to have been made in and will be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of New York.
15. Any notice required to be given to either party will be written and sent to The District or Village addresses shown on page one, by either registered or certified mail.
16. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which will be deemed an original and will not become effective and binding upon the District or Village until accepted and executed by the authorized signatory as set forth in the respective resolutions of the Brockport Fire District Board of Fire Commissioners and the Village of Brockport Board of Trustees.
