

**Regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Brockport was held in the Conference Room, Municipal Building, 49 State Street, Brockport, New York, September 19, 2005 at 7:00pm.**

**CALL TO ORDER:** Mayor Wexler called the meeting to order and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

**REVIEW OF MEETING MINUTES:** Mayor Wexler called for any additions or corrections to the minutes of the regular meeting held September 6, 2005.

➔ Trustee Wagenhauser moved, Trustee Maziarz seconded, unanimously carried that the minutes of the meeting held September 6, 2005, be approved as amended.

Trustee Wagenhauser commented that at the last meeting under review of the meeting minutes the reason he brought up the fact that Police Chief Varrenti does not get health insurance or retirement through the Village of Brockport was that he read in the paper that the Mayor wanted Brockport's Police Chief to be in line with what other Police Chiefs in the County get. He said it was not to negotiate at the meeting.

**PUBLIC COMMENT:**

1. Linda Borrayo of 155 Utica Street referred to Mayor Wexler's letter in the recent Tri County Advertiser and thanked Mayor Wexler and Trustees Castañeda and Nayman for being the voice of the taxpayer.

**GUESTS:**

1. Jimmy Zisovski – Peddling Permit application for food concession cart – Jimmy Z's - Main Street – J. Zisovski said his business gets very busy late night on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays and that he is losing some customers who do not wish to wait in a long line. He said he would like to put a table outside on the Village sidewalk in front of the restaurant on those nights from 11pm to 3am to offer pulled pork sandwiches. This item has been on the menu for 8 months and is a big seller. The table would have a warmer with the pulled pork and rolls. He has previously provided his certificate of insurance and copy of Monroe County Health Department permit to the Village Clerk. Clerk Morelli confirmed that these are current. J. Zisovski said nothing would actually be cooked or prepared outside. He only wishes to do this during decent weather from this Thursday until Thanksgiving. Then he would offer the product from the ice cream window in the vestibule.

Trustee Maziarz expressed concern about additional garbage. J. Zisovski said he picks up litter between his restaurant and the Strand at closing every morning. Trustee Maziarz said for a while the Village was paying a DPW employee overtime to come in for a couple of hours on Sunday mornings before the Farmer's Market opened to pick up garbage. To save money, a couple of citizens have been volunteering their time to do so. There is an amazing amount of trash. She said this could add more trash to litter the street. J. Zisovski said he would be willing to put out an extra trashcan and bring it in at closing. Trustee Maziarz asked about the tables and chairs. J. Zisovski said those are brought in by 11pm, as the sidewalk café permit requires.

Chief Varrenti asked if there would be a cart on the sidewalk. J. Zisovski said no. It would be a table with a 12 x 6 warmer with an extension cord into the restaurant. There would be no cooking or preparation outside. He said he does have that ability and has done so at the Farmer's Market and Sidewalk Sale. Chief Varrenti asked why he needs to do this outside. J. Zisovski said he is losing customers due to the long line from 11pm to 3am. Some just want to grab something quick and walk back to campus. He said it would also attract passers by. Once they know it is available and it moves inside to the ice cream window, he will have established the customer base for the product. He said he would like to do so on a trial basis. If it does not work or if there are problems, he can drop it. S. Zarnstorff asked if soda would be available outside. J. Zisovski said it would likely be the warmer with the pulled pork, bread and canned or bottled soda. S. Zarnstorff asked if this would take place in bad weather. J. Zisovski said not if it is raining or snowing. It will be weather dependant.

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Trustee Wagenhauser asked if he would have a cash register outside. J. Zisovski said not a register, but a box. Trustee Wagenhauser said he eats there often, but wondered why utilizing the ice cream window from the start would not work. J. Zisovski said he wants to draw from the outside and attract passers by and hopes for word of mouth. Trustee Wagenhauser asked if he would want to do this again come spring. J. Zisovski said he may not need to come spring if he has built up a following. Trustee Wagenhauser said he would be willing to grant approval for a trial period, but would want the trash concern dealt with.

Chief Varrenti suggested that he utilize a metal cash box and have it bolted to the table so there would be no grab and run. J. Zisovski said another option he is considering is using a money apron so the money is on the person. Chief Varrenti said he would not want to see the employee hurt if someone were to try to take the money off of him/her.

→ Trustee Maziarz moved, Trustee Wagenhauser seconded, unanimously carried to grant approval, on a trial basis from 11pm to 3am on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays September 22<sup>nd</sup> through November 20<sup>th</sup> use of the Village sidewalk in front of Jimmy Z's for a table to offer pulled pork sandwiches and bottled soda.

Clerk Morelli referred to her note attached to the application regarding the permit fee. There are 3 fee levels for "hawking and peddling". One to seven days is \$100. Six months or less is \$250. One year is \$500. J. Zisovski said he will only be utilizing 2 months and wondered if the Board would pro-rate the \$250 fee.

→ Trustee Maziarz moved, Trustee Wagenhauser seconded, unanimously carried to charge a permit fee of \$125.

**DEPARTMENT REPORTS:**

**A. PUBLIC WORKS / COMMUNICATIONS CENTER – Superintendent Harry G. Donahue**

1. Bid Results – 38 Market Street – Fire Department roof – H. Donahue reported that 2 bids were received by the September 15<sup>th</sup> deadline. Leo J. Roth Corporation with a base bid of \$83,600 and an alternate bid of \$6,400 and Elmer W. Davis, Inc. with a base bid of \$78,777 and an alternate bid of \$3,500. H. Donahue recommended the Board accept the low bid.

Mayor Wexler asked if it could be done before winter. H. Donahue said yes. Trustee Maziarz asked if there is money budgeted. I. Coyle said there is money available in different line items of the Fire Department, but money was not budgeted specifically for this project. He and the Fire Chiefs need to work out the financing. Mayor Wexler said the roof needs were brought to the former Mayor and Board's attention two years ago and was never dealt with. He thanked H. Donahue and I. Coyle for bringing this to the forefront. Mayor Wexler said it may have been cheaper two years ago, but needs to get done without further delay.

Trustee Wagenhauser asked if this cost would be shared with the Towns of Sweden and Clarkson in the overall fire budget. I. Coyle said yes. He asked if it would be split in thirds.

Mayor Wexler said it is based on assessed value – Sweden 40%, Clarkson 35% and Brockport 25%. I. Coyle concurred. Trustee Wagenhauser asked H. Donahue if he recommends the alternate bid of the low bidder as well. H. Donahue said yes. The DPW did a patch job on the stair tower roof last year, but to have it done with this project will provide a 20-year warranty.

Trustee Maziarz asked I. Coyle what "working out the financing" means. I. Coyle said he has a call in to Rural Development to see if there are any quick grant opportunities. Otherwise it can come from various Fire Department line items or be spread out over a couple of budget years. He said the Fire Department has enough money to cover the expense if grant money is not available.

Merv Beaney of Coleman Creek Road asked if this was to re-do the entire roof. H. Donahue said the truck bay and stair tower. The rest of the roof was done a few years ago.

Trustee Maziarz said this is a lot of money and she would prefer to know where exactly the money would come from before accepting the bid and beginning work. I. Coyle stressed the importance of not delaying work since winter weather is not that far off. Trustee Wagenhauser questioned why there were only 2 bids submitted. I. Coyle said they had several inquiries, but after reviewing the specifications, only 2 companies bid for the project. Trustee Wagenhauser questioned what the bids were a couple of years ago. I. Coyle said it was not bid out previously. The former DPW Superintendent had received one rough estimate of \$41,000, but that was not based on any specifications. Trustee Wagenhauser said the Village Board just received this bid results before the meeting. Trustee Maziarz said she imagines

Trustees Castañeda and Wagenhauser asked how long the estimates one month.

Nayman would want to be involved in this decision. Trustee project would take. H. Donahue said he is not sure, but

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I. Coyle said besides Rural Development grant opportunities or the Fire Department fully funding it, he can look into other financing options if the Board desires. Mary Ann Rogers of Perry Street spoke up and said she hopes the Village would not subject taxpayers to financing at high interest rates.

D. Wagenhauser said he understands the work needs to be done and it is weather dependant, but would like I. Coyle to look into grant opportunities with Rural Development before making a commitment. He said he would be willing to authorize the acceptance of the bid tonight pending obtaining a 70% grant.

→ Trustee Maziarz moved to table decision until the next Village Board meeting. No second. Motion died.

This will automatically be brought forward to workshop for discussion and next meeting for vote.

**B. POLICE DEPARTMENT – Chief Daniel P. Varrenti**

1. Calls for service – Chief Varrenti shared that they have been very busy. There was a very violent rape two nights ago on State Street. The victim knew their attacker. He is in jail.
2. Follow up on complaint by Denise Woods – Chief Varrenti shared that he met with Denise Woods of Fair Street on September 7<sup>th</sup>. She had complained at the last meeting of noise from a business called Tac Screw in Industrial zoning near her on Burroughs Terrace. He said it was a worthwhile meeting and a lot of general confusion was cleared up. She now understands that she needs to call 911 for police. Chief Varrenti said he also met with property owner Marv Duryea today who was very concerned about the property he owns and promised to rectify the problem.

Chief Varrenti said it has been 2 years since the Brockport Police Department went to 911 and many people are still reluctant to call. He stressed that it is not for emergencies only. Any time someone wants to get a hold of a police officer, they must call 911.

3. Update on Watch Your Car Program – Chief Varrenti reminded all that Sgt. Cuzzupoli was trained in the Watch Your Car Program that includes decals and etching vehicle identification numbers in windshields. The training and equipment was obtained through a grant at no cost to the Village. This is a free service for Village residents. They are taking appointments for days when Sgt. Cuzzupoli is working and there at least 3 officers on. It takes about 15 minutes per vehicle.

Trustee Maziarz suggested opening up the service to SUNY students since there is a large commuter population. Mary Ann Rogers of Perry Street said students should have it done in their hometown. Chief Varrenti said not all lawn enforcement agencies provide this service. However, the Monroe County Sheriff's Department has the ability to do, but the person may have to go downtown or to a substation. Chief Varrenti said he would rather start with Village residents before considering opening it up. Trustee Wagenhauser said he feels more comfortable with offering this free service to Village residents unless others are charged.

4. Car Show report – Chief Varrenti said the Lion's Club Car Cruise In was held Saturday, September 10<sup>th</sup>. He said he realizes the next one would likely not be until July 2006, but would like the opportunity to sit down with the organizers some time soon to express some concerns and come up with some solutions. He said it is a wonderful event, but it upsets many people, makes roads impassible and blocks parking on Main Street. He said there must be a better place than New York State Route 19 to hold the car cruise ins. 200 to 300 cars participate, but they are not just here for the 3 hour or so duration of the event. Some begin taking up parking on Main Street as early as 9am. Merchants and citizens are inconvenienced for the entire day. He said Jack Barry and Al Hammel of the Lions Club are great to work with, but some more organization is needed.

Mayor Wexler agreed and said he spoke with Al Hammel, who as a former police officer is familiar with crowd control issues. He said he would be happy to meet with Village officials to make any improvements necessary. They do not want to lose the events as they serve as fundraisers and bring in approximately \$1,000 each time the cruise in is held. Mayor Wexler said the 2-hour parking limitation in the commercial district is only Monday through Friday. These cruise ins are held twice a year on Saturdays. Therefore, participants do come and park early. Mayor Wexler said Saturday, September 10<sup>th</sup> was a particularly beautiful day with lots of

events in the Village.

Scott Hunsinger said he is Acting 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President of the Lions Club. They have a meeting this week and he will be sure there is quality discussion on this issue. Mayor Wexler asked that he be sure to relay that the Village does not want to get rid of the car cruise ins. S. Hunsinger said he would relay that message.

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**C. BUILDING / ZONING / CODE ENFORCEMENT - Scott C. Zarnstorff**

1. Staff - S. Zarnstorff shared that new part time clerk Michelle Johnson had an emergency appendectomy and will be out 2 to 3 weeks. Larry Vaughan will be a first time grandparent within the week.
2. Information Blitz – S. Zarnstorff reported that the September 10<sup>th</sup> information blitz to off campus student rental housing went well. He thanked Trustees Maziarz and Castañeda for their help as well as S. Winner and several Fire Department members. They distributed 370 packets of information on a very busy weekend.
3. All You Ever Wanted to Know About Code Enforcement – S. Zarnstorff reminded the Board of this seminar to be held Tuesday, September 20<sup>th</sup> at 6pm at the Seymour Library. A representative from the NYS Codes Division, and former Code Enforcement Officer, will make a presentation and take questions to officials from Brockport, Sweden, Clarkson, Hamlin. Clerk Morelli forwarded the information to the Planning Board and ZBA by e-mail as well.
4. Updates – S. Zarnstorff reported on updates of issues brought up at the last meeting. Regarding Westwood Drive, the trailer has been removed. Regarding Burroughs Terrace, Village officials met with Denise Wood and Marv Duryea separately. Some misnomers were cleared up and the property owner and business operator have agreed to make some concessions. Regarding 60 Perry Street and the concern of possible over-occupancy, the property owner was sent a Notice and Order to comply within 10 days. Such notice was sent through regular mail and registered mail. The registered mail was returned unaccepted. S. Zarnstorff said he is meeting with the new Village Attorney tomorrow. They will plan the next step once the 10 days passes.

**D. FIRE DEPARTMENT – Fire Chiefs (excused)**

1. Membership Adds/Drops/Transfers – On behalf of the Fire Chiefs Clerk Morelli asked the Board to consider approving the following adds: James Clarke to Explorer Post, Cody Butler to Explorer Post, Paul Drake to Fire Police, Matthew Sloan of SUNY as a Mutual Aid Member.

→ Trustee Maziarz moved, Trustee Wagenhauser seconded, unanimously carried approving the previously mentioned adds.

2. Call Load – 1193 Ambulance calls year to date. 642 Fire calls year to date.

**VILLAGE BOARD REPORTS:**

- A. Trustee/Vice Mayor Maziarz
  1. Fire Department Picnic – Trustee Maziarz thanked the Fire Department for a nice family picnic on September 10<sup>th</sup>.
  2. Canal Conference – Trustee Maziarz reported that the state Canal Conference held in Rochester was a huge success. The mobile workshop to the west side on September 12<sup>th</sup> went well. A diverse group including Senator Maziarz and the Director of the Erie Canal National Heritage Corridor Commission appointed by Congress were in attendance. They and Mayor Wexler made a few remarks. They met at the Welcome Center, toured the Main Street Historic Commercial District, pointing out the architecture, sitting pretty bench program and

sculpture plans. They ended with food and drink at the Merchant Street Smoke House. This showcased the importance of public funding to spur private sector funding. Trustee Maziarz gave special thanks to Scott Hunsinger and the Merchant Street Smoke House.

She and S. Winner met with Mayor Wexler today to review the conference highlights. They are looking to make the canal a 4 seasons activity with winter sports such as ice skating and skiing. They are also looking to create campsites for hikers and bikers such as Holley did.

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3. Taxpayer Dollars – Trustee Maziarz said she has been inappropriately classified as not caring about taxpayer dollars in recent letters in the local newspapers regarding the Police Chief’s contract. She said she is indeed very interested in where tax dollars go. Regarding the issue of the police chief contract, she stressed the importance of attempting to negotiate prior to taking action that would incur legal expenses.

**B. Trustee Castañeda (excused – NYCOM)**

Clerk Morelli read the following report from Trustee Castañeda:

- I am grateful for the opportunity I had to participate in the distribution of the student information packets Saturday morning, September 10<sup>th</sup>.
- Congratulations to the Morgan Manning Historical Association on another successful Peddler’s Market. What a great opportunity to showcase our wonderful Village.
- My family and I enjoyed wonderful food and a warm reception at the Fire Department picnic September 10<sup>th</sup>.
- The 12-hour vigil on September 11<sup>th</sup> under the leadership of the Fire Department was well prepared and well attended. It was important for our community to remember and never forget the many innocent lives that were lost that day. Thank you to all those involved.

At the last meeting I asked, “Who was responsible for the error on the steps at Harvester Park?” I would still like an answer to this question.

H. Donahue said he is not sure anyone is to blame, but that they met last week and agreed to the fastest and least expensive resolution. The DPW will cut treads off rather than re-do the stairs.

**C. Trustee Wagenhauser**

1. Taxpayer Dollars – Trustee Wagenhauser said he echoes Trustee Maziarz’ comments regarding being miss-classified as not caring about taxpayer dollars. He said anyone who was in attendance or read the August 15, 2005 meeting minutes knows that his concerns were of a financial nature.
2. Westwood Drive – Trustee Wagenhauser said Carol Cole who complained at the last meeting of the trailer in the driveway next door to her is thrilled that it is gone and that she can see sunshine again.
3. Contacts from Constituents – Trustee Wagenhauser shared that he was contacted by 5 residents over the past two weeks with regard to vandalism including a new tree being uprooted, 2 fences being damaged, 1 door being kicked in and 1 window being opened and an extension cord being unplugged and a fan stolen. These are on top of noise, beer bottle littering and public vomiting. He said many expressed concern of retribution if they call the police. One said they called the SUNY President and his secretary indicated that they are not aware of any such issues. He asked Chief Varrenti if SUNY is still being sent copies of Brockport Police reports that involve students and if residents call 911 if there is a way to withhold giving out their name as the complainant.

Chief Varrenti said when someone calls 911, the phone number they are calling from pops up on 911’s screen. This is a safety precaution so that if the caller cannot speak, responders know where to go. It is best that a caller provides their name and address and specify to the operator that they do not want any police contact. By having the name and address, a deposition can be obtained if it should be needed. However, they do not have to provide their name and address. The responding officers will NOT identify the complainant to a suspect. Both 911 and police officers are sensitive to complainants not wanting retaliation. Regarding providing information to SUNY, Chief Varrenti said that the Brockport Police Department forwards reports to SUNY University Police Chief Kehoe when it involves the arrest of a SUNY student. They do not give them other reports, as they would have no use for them. There is a continuous open line of communication between SUNY Police and Brockport Police.

Trustee Wagenhauser said often the complainant has a pretty good idea if it is a college student. He said he was on the Good Neighbor Committee at one time and thinks that part of the problem is that SUNY may not know of the problems. He said maybe Chief Kehoe does

not pass the information upwards. Chief Varrenti said he knows Chief Kehoe passes it up to  
the Vice President for Student Affairs. The President is brand new.

Chief Varrenti said past practice before his arrival was that the responding Brockport Police  
officer went to the complainant and asked if they wanted to press charges. He said that was  
ridiculous. If the violation is occurring in the presence of the Brockport Police Department,  
they will automatically take appropriate action. Chief Varrenti encouraged residents to call and  
let the Police Department do its job.

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S. Zarnstorff shared that he and L. Vaughan from Code Enforcement have been out and about  
the past few weekends. Information has been shared with Mayor Wexler and SUNY Vice  
President for Student Affairs Di Pasquale, who indicated an interest in continuing to receive  
such information. S. Zarnstorff said he would be happy to copy their reports to Trustee  
Wagenhauser.

4. DPW – Street Paving Plan – Trustee Wagenhauser said at the last meeting he said he would  
like residents to be able to contact the Village, provide their street name and find out when the  
DPW plans to repair or pave that particular street. He said he felt guilty afterwards for  
throwing that burden on H. Donahue. Therefore, he said he has offered to create a database  
over the next 6 months to assist in this endeavor.

5. Garbage – Trustee Wagenhauser said he hopes to update the Village Board at their next  
workshop on his research regarding the Village contracting with one waste hauler for garbage  
pick up. He has sample contracts to save legal fees. He said a 2002 Comptroller study  
showed that municipalities who contract for garbage services rather than individual households  
benefit from an average savings of \$156 per house, less traffic from garbage trucks and less  
wear and tear on roads. They could also write in garbage pick up times so as not to have  
problems of early morning noise.

6. Cost Cutting Measures – Trustee Wagenhauser said he and Trustee Maziarz have set a goal  
of presenting one new cost cutting method per Board meeting. He said today he spoke with  
Manager Coyle and Deputy Clerk Coopenberg regarding payroll. Currently the Village pays  
Complete Payroll Processing \$182 to \$190 bi-weekly for payroll. He said the company he  
manages has a similar number of employees and pays less. He thinks the Village could save  
up to \$2,000 per year if they put it out to bid. He said both Ian and Betty have expressed a  
willingness to entertain information from other vendors.

D. Trustee Nayman (excused – NYCOM)  
Clerk Morelli read the following report from Trustee Nayman:

I'd like to thank BISCO for its donation of \$325. This money is to be used to purchase an  
American flag that is to be placed on the Park Avenue flagpole. I'd also like to commend the  
members of BISCO for another successful Arts Festival. The planning, hard work and  
cooperative attitude displayed by the members while completing such a task is amazing.

I'd also like to thank the staff at the Sweden Senior Center for the Village Board's September 9<sup>th</sup>  
invitation to tour and have lunch at the Center. The delicious meal and friendly atmosphere was  
truly enjoyed.

Lastly, I'd like to compliment the Fire Department. Their 12-hour vigil on September 11<sup>th</sup>  
commemorating the 2001 events was most heartwarming. I think we sometimes forget the  
dedication this department extends to our safety and well being year after year.

E. Mayor Wexler

1. 2006-2007 Budget Process – Mayor Wexler noted that Manager Coyle is beginning to work  
with Department Heads on the next fiscal year budget.

2. Tac Screw – Mayor Wexler noted that Marv Duryea's name took some heat during the last  
meeting's public comment period. He shared that M. Duryea is in the audience tonight and  
had contacted him from Florida and promised to mitigate the complaint.

3. 9/11 Vigil – Mayor Wexler commended the Fire Department for the annual vigil. He gave a  
special thanks to Public Information Officer Christopher R. Martin who is extremely organized  
and does a wonderful job.

4. Homecoming / Parents Weekend – Mayor Wexler reminded everyone that this weekend is  
SUNY Homecoming / parents Weekend. He mentioned that he and Chief Varrenti would be  
having lunch with the new SUNY President and his wife and Vice President for Student Affairs

Di Pasquale. He commented that he and Police Chief Varrenti may disagree on his contract that was disaffirmed 8/15, but they can still talk and work towards the good of the Village. The pending issue will get resolved.

**PUBLIC COMMENT:**

1. Kathy Snyder of Lyman Street asked who changed the design of the stairs at Harvester Park and how they passed code inspection. She said they were not done as approved in the original plans. H. Donahue said the previous DPW Superintendent and the Village Engineer experienced problems coordinating work with the DPW and the contractor. The change was supposed to be a cost saving measure. S. Zarnstorff said he inspected the stairs and was not aware they had been changed from the original plan. He noted deficiencies in construction and therefore wrote up a review and had the

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Village Engineer verify the non-compliance. Last week, S. Zarnstorff, H. Donahue and the Village Engineer met on site and reviewed the situation.

K. Snyder commented that the doors at the Welcome Center go in instead of out and asked if the Welcome Center is considered a public place of assembly. S. Zarnstorff said per State Code it is classified as an office – business type use that allows for a conference room with a maximum occupancy for meetings.

K. Snyder said H. Donahue was appointed as DPW Superintendent at the last meeting, but his salary was not announced. I. Coyle said it is \$65,000 and change. John Lessord of Lyman Street asked if this is the same as the last DPW Superintendent. H. Donahue said he thinks it is \$30 more. J. Lessord said it should be since H. Donahue is doing a better job. Mayor Wexler concurred that H. Donahue is doing a fine job.

2. Mary Ann Rogers of Perry Street said she had an idea for the Police Chief. She said she works at SUNY and reads The Stylus. There is a police blotter for campus police happenings. She suggested the Brockport Police Department forward its weekly police blotter that involves students in the Stylus. She said this might help inform the President and administrators and hold them accountable. Chief Varrenti said we are halfway there since Sgt. Phillip forwards the Brockport police blotter to other print media. They can highlight what is applicable to SUNY students and ask for a space in the Stylus. M.A. Rogers said she works at the college and has a good rapport with students. Chief Varrenti said he loves college students, has 2 daughters in college, teaches at SUNY and can't imagine the Village of Brockport without the College. He said 2% of the population commits 98% of the crime. He said he believes this is true for the college population. He said Ray DiPasquale, Vice President for Student Affairs wants to do a police ride along.
